The Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID) is a statewide numbering system that is different from the course numbers assigned by individual California Community Colleges. A C-ID Designator next to a course means that the course is comparable in content and scope to a course offered by participating California colleges and universities. Thus, if the Solano Community College courses are listed below with a C-ID Designator, students can be assured that the courses will be accepted at a California college or university that offers the courses with the same C-ID Designator.

C-ID Designation may change periodically, visit https://c-id.net/courses for current designation or consult with your counselor. The C-ID Numbering System is particularly useful for students attending more than one California Community College since C-ID Designators are often applied to courses students need to prepare for transfer.

MATH - Mathematics

STAT 311 Introduction to Statistics Support 0.5 Units

Corequisite**: STAT C1000 Transferable to UC/CSU Hours: 32-36 lab

A review of the core prerequisite skills, competencies, and concepts needed in statistics. Intended for students who are concurrently enrolled in STAT C1000, Introduction to Statistics. Topics include concepts from arithmetic, pre-algebra, elementary and intermediate algebra, and descriptive statistics that are needed to understand the basics of college-level statistics. Concepts are taught through the context of descriptive data analysis. Additional emphasis is placed on solving and graphing linear equations and modeling with linear functions. Enrollment in the course may occur as a result of the recommendation of a counselor or math instructor based on a Multiple Measures Evaluation. *This course is Pass/No Pass only.*

NURS - Nursing

NURS 073B Psychiatric and Mental Health Nursing

3.0 Unit

Prerequisite: NURS 071A and NURS 071S

Corequisite: NURS 072S Transferable to CSU

Hours: 24-27 lecture, 72-81 lab

Applies the concepts of nursing practice presented in NURS 071A and then focuses on additional concepts for safe, compassionate, patient-centered care to a diverse patient population focusing on wellness for a psychiatric patient. This course also applies nursing concepts to the care of children receiving mental health services. The goal is to provide students opportunities to integrate all program concepts to the care of mental health patients. Application of knowledge and skills occurs in a variety of clinical settings. NURS 072P Pediatric Nursing

Corequisite: NURS 072S Transferable to CSU

Hours: 24-27 lecture, 72-81 lab

Introduction to pediatric nursing principles, guiding students to apply the nursing process and basic clinical reasoning to provide safe and compassionate care for children with acute or chronic conditions. Through diverse hands-on clinical experiences, students will begin to develop and incorporate their skills in communication, teamwork, and understanding ethical and legal responsibilities in nursing practice. The course also introduces basic pharmacological concepts and evidencebased practices to ensure safe medication administration for pediatric patients. This course prepares students to care for children and families, providing foundational knowledge and skills for nursing practice in various healthcare settings. Internet and PC computer access with chrome web browser required in order to utilizes online NCLEX test preparation software, skills videos and to complete course materials utilizing word, excel and PDF documents.

NURS 103 Certified Nursing Assistant

7.0 Units

Prerequisite**: Applicants must be at least 16 years old Non-transferable to UC or CSU

Hours: 72-81 lecture, 120-135 lab

Basic computer navigation skills and frequent internet access is required. Prepares the student to function in the role of Certified Nursing Assistant in the acute care, long-term care, and home health settings. Students must apply to the CNA program through Solano Community College's Office of Admissions and Records, as well as attend a mandatory information session prior to the beginning of class.

Certificate of Achievement and Associate in Arts

Program Description

Explore the camera and lighting techniques used to create photographs of products, and other subjects including food, product, clothing and accessories, and lifestyle, with an emphasis on the advertising and editorial markets. Students will learn about both historical and contemporary practitioners, with an emphasis on diversity, and an exploration of issues of equity, race and representation in the photo and advertising industries. Students will also learn about professional practices and industry opportunities. Digital SLR or comparable camera required. A very limited number of cameras are available to loan for students who cannot provide their own. Field trips may be required but students will have options if they are unable to attend.

PHOT 554 0.0 Units

Architectural Photography

Prerequisite**: PHOT 029 or PHOT 529 Non-transferable to UC or CSU Equivalent Course: PHOT 154 Hours: 24-27 lecture, 72-81 lab

Explore architectural photography, including the skills needed to produce photographs of both the exterior and the interior of structures, including perspective, specialty cameras and lenses, and post-production. Students will learn about both historical and contemporary practitioners, with an emphasis on diversity, and an exploration of issues of equity and ethics in the profession of architectural photography. Students will also learn about professional practices and industry opportunities. *Digital SLR or comparable camera*. *Field trips will be part of the course for hybrid and on campus classes*. *Online and hybrid classes require access to a computer that can run Adobe Creative Cloud programs*. *Software is available through Solano and there are a small number of computer for loan to students who cannot supply their own*.

On campus students will have access to the studio and lab. All students will be able to check out a range of photographic equipment to help complete coursework, including special lenses and lighting equipment.

Research Methods in Behavioral Science

An introduction to basic research methods in the behavioral sciences. Assumptions and goals of science are considered as well as several specific research techniques and designs. The ethics of research with human and animal subjects will be covered.
